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Network Summary

Natural resources remain a foundational element of rural places. Sustainable natural resource management is increasingly critical for the overall health and wellbeing of not only rural places, but the world. The core of the Natural Resources Development Network (NRDN) is the exploration, understanding, sharing, and building knowledge around the sustainable management of natural resources in rural places. The NRDN is committed to building and sharing an enhanced understanding of natural resources, and how these resources can be managed for the betterment of rural places.

The objective of the NRDN is to support its members in undertaking activities that include a focus on one or more of the following:

- i. food and food security;
- ii. climate change;
- iii. rural community development;
- iv. industry and trade;
- v. land and water;
- vi. energy; and
- vii. overarching related governance and policy.

The outputs of the network, described in more detail below, include the following:

- Funding for members to attend targeted events for networking and knowledge sharing;
- Facilitation of webinars;
- Funding for knowledge mobilization in the form of knowledge briefs, policy briefs, and team position papers; and
- Support for collaborative projects between network members.

1. Actions and Products

1.1. Member Engagement

<u>Network members</u> are afforded the ability to choose whether to be an active or passive member (see existing NRD Work Plan), allowing members to select their level of participation, and aiding leadership in identifying those most interested in taking on larger roles in the network. As part of the re-boot of the NRD team into the NRDN, all existing members will be given a questionnaire, allowing us to update their interests and expertise, as well as to gauge their preferred level of participation.

The NRDN will build on the existing NRD engagement that includes regular electronic updates and newsletters, sharing of information and opportunities, and webinars. The NRDN will continue these activities, but expand on them, including: team meetings (quarterly), digital lunch and learn discussions (quarterly), contributions to and sharing of the common event calendar (operated by the Canadian Rural Revitalization Foundation in partnership with RPLC), and social media engagement (Twitter, Facebook, Instagram).

1.2. Natural Resource Development Policy Fellow participate

Overview

Under the Natural Resource Development Team we identified <u>Tara Clapp</u> as our Public Policy Fellow. The RPLC Public Policy Fellow initiative is designed to recognize public policy actors that are making a substantial contribution to rural policy, whether at the local, regional, provincial, national, or international scale. This initiative facilitates the engagement of public policy actors within the RPLC network and among RPLC activities. Originally allocated \$3,000 in 2017, an additional \$1,000 was allocated in 2018 to continue supporting this position (e.g., travel costs), but was not intended to be financial compensation. Expectations

It is expected the Public Policy Fellow would work towards advancing the mandate and vision of RPLC. Within the Natural Resources Development Network, RPLC Public Policy Fellows will be appointed to work within one of the above-mentioned four areas of focus. Activities will be specific to each fellow, but potential activities of a Public Policy Fellow could include:



- connecting with and/or mentoring graduate students interested in natural resource development
- identifying new natural resource development research topics
- assisting in advancing natural resource development policy
- advising on policy briefs
- helping to ground policy discussions in the perspectives of rural practitioners
- attending and presenting at prioritized conferences
- contributing to articles, blog posts, and knowledge mobilization events

1.3. Literature Reviews

The Natural Resource Development Network has funded students with \$15,950 to support the completion of 12 targeted literature reviews related to the core areas of focus. Literature reviews are intended to synthesize current literature to inform team members as well as a wider audience. Completed products will be shared with the team and applicable networks. The NRDN has \$1,800 to support ~2 new literature reviews.

Matched or supplemental funding from team members facilitated broadening the scope of the literature review or the creation of additional products (e.g., creation of a position paper, knowledge briefs, etc.).

The following criteria was used for hiring students:

- Current graduate student in a relevant discipline
- Direct research and/or professional experience related to the topic
- Experience gathering, synthesizing, and summarizing information for decision makers and the public



- Experience writing literature reviews, annotated bibliographies, knowledge briefs, and/or other related or similar products
- Ability to work independently

Members who received funding were expected to:

- 1) Display the RPLC logo on their literature review
- 2) Share their literature review on the website
- 3) Include disclaimer This literature review was not peer-reviewed by the NRDN and does not necessarily reflect the position of the RPLC, the NRDN co-leads or their institutions.

To apply team members must:

- 1) Submit a short (1-2 paragraph) description and justification of the proposed policy brief.
- 2) Fill in the application for funding (<u>https://forms.selkirk.ca/view.php?id=47747</u>).

The first call for applications ended in July 2016. The second call ended January 31, 2017. The third call for applications ended February 14, 2018. The fourth call for applications ended June 18th, 2018. The fifth call for applications ended April 15th, 2019. The sixth call for applications ended July 15th, 2019. <u>The next call for applications ends September 30th, 2019.</u>

To date, 9 literature reviews (Table 2) were completed and 3 remain in progress (Table 3).

1.4. Policy Briefs

A total of \$9,000 has been allocated to support the completion of ~9 targeted policy briefs. Completed policy briefs will be sent to the target government as a recommendation from the entire RPLC Natural Resource Development Network. The NRDN has \$6,000 to support ~8 new policy briefs (~4 at \$500/ea and ~4 at \$1000/ea).

1.6.2. Blogging

1.6.3. Twitter

The NRD team had a @RPLC_NRD Twitter account until June 2016. The Twitter handle was maintained by the Team Lead and Team Support and used to re-post articles and follow groups of interest. However, this Twitter account was deactivated in June 2016 in an attempt to consolidate the RPLC social media accounts. A hashtag (#RPLC_NRD) has been created to allow Twitter users to specifically flag things of interest to natural resources.
